Celebrating Pendleton's Collaborative Spirit

Downtown Pendleton holds a special place in my heart. In the middle of the pandemic, my husband Josh and I decided to buy a house. For several months we traveled throughout Oregon and Washington, looking for a house and community to call our own.

It was love at first sight with our house, but what of Pendleton itself? We explored the town to find out. Walking downtown is a trusty way to learn about a city. Strolling over the Main Street Bridge we were quickly charmed. So many examples of a thriving town met us-river views, an art center with gallery space and gift shop, brick buildings seemingly from classic Westerns, bronze statues highlighting local figures, multiple restaurants and even a historical museum. After exploring the rest of town we found ourselves drawn back downtown. Sipping our first cups of Great Pacific coffee, we were glad to have made Pendleton our new home.

Several years later I'm once again standing on the Main Street Bridge. This time I've just finished the final test of the Legends of Pendleton: Figures, Myths, and the Spirit of Resilience. Multiple organizations collaborated to create this free audio walking tour: Pendleton Urban Renewal, Historic Preservation Commission, Heritage Station Museum, Umatilla Historical Society, Chamber of Commerce, Travel Pendleton, Eastern Oregon Visitors Association, and of course the Pendleton Downtown Association. The tour is both entertaining and educational. It fills me with such joy knowing that I was a part of a project that highlights my home in such a positive light.

I'm writing this letter after working on another collaborative project-the Beacon of the Sentinels. This is an Arts Commission public art memorial created to honor veterans. Today veterans, a City Council member, City staff, gardeners, and knitters all lent helping hands. Together we painted the concrete border walls a light bronze to compliment the rusted steel statue in the center of the memorial. With so many hands pitching in, our work went quickly, and the day was filled with laughter, stories, and camaraderie. Experiences like these remind me how much our town can accomplish when we roll up our sleeves together.

This past May another collaboration brought the Pendleton Street Fair back after decades of hiatus. Originating in 1907, the PSF was an annual Main Street affair. Sidewalk sales, parades, theater shows, musical acts and even bucking horses were on display. Stakeholders include the Historic Preservation Commission, Heritage Station Museum, Umatilla County Historical Society and the PDA. Despite early rain and some cancellations, we revived the fair. Thanks to the Pendleton Underground live tours and the Kiwanis, fair guests were treated to historical protestors and cotton candy. City Council and Historic Preservation Commission members staffed the info booths, handing out candy and listening to the public's feedback. Main Street businesses and local vendors welcomed fair guests with open doors. The community showed up for fun. Their feedback? Good for a start but we want more.

We hear you: The theme of Pendleton Street Fair 2026 will be More games, More vendors, More fun!

Though each project is unique, each shows that Pendleton shines brightest when neighbors, organizations, and leaders come together to celebrate our history and build our future. I look forward to future collaborations that uplift our community.

Q&A with Jesselee Leachman of The Zom-B13 Zombie Response Team





The Zom-B13 Zombie Response Team first made its debut at the Pendleton Dress-Up parade in 2016. Since then, the team has suited up, shown up and live-streamed a plethora of parades, including Dress-Up, Pendleton Pride, and the Christmas Light Parade, making them both a major Pendleton booster and a driving force in preparing Pendletonians for potential undead outbreaks. Newsletter editor (and lifelong zombie flick aficionado) Josh Brown sat down with Jesselee over coffee at Hamley Cafe to discuss Pendleton, zombies and the important work being carried out by his team.

What are the origins of the Pendleton Zombie Outbreak Response Team? We started in 2016. I had a black car and wanted to do something interesting, so I slapped a Zombie Outreach Response Team logo on the car. The car began turning heads, and before long we were participating in local parades as the Zombie Outbreak Mobile Battalion.

Most folks don't know about the work your team does outside of attending parades and festivals. Could you speak to this a bit?

Sure! In 2021 we started a program called Back to Ghoul in the parking lot next to the Round-Up gift shop, where we gave away around 25 backpacks filled with school supplies. The next year we gave away 250 school supply filled backpacks, and in 2023 we had our biggest event ever, working alongside BACA (Bikers Against Child Abuse) where they provided Safety IDs for children, and a Beauty College out of the Tri-Cities who donated time to provide free haircuts to students in need while we gave away over 500 backpacks filled with school supplies.

What about Zombie Claus?

The original intention with Zombie Claus was to create a Christmas event where we could help a randomly chosen family with their Christmas wish list by covering nearly all expenses by requesting their wish list of needs and wants, in our own unique zombie way. I reached out to a few businesses and they rejected the idea. It was only when I reached out to Josh and Jenifer at Unity Collectables that the idea came to life the way I'd envisioned it.



Zom-B13 has participated in many events since 2016. What's the general reaction to your presence?

Almost entirely positive, but we've had a few detractors as well. There was someone who wasn't happy with the Zombie Uncle Sam, or Uncle Zam as he's known, in the July 4th parade. I believe they said that we were "troubled people who should be monitored" and one had once said they would run for city council just so they could force our group out of city events.

How do you deal with the negative feedback?

Mostly I just ignore it. We have way more supporters who'll stick up for us and let people know how much we do for the community. If people want to be negative, hey, it's a free country. We know that we're doing good in the community. We're not looking for rewards or accolades, we just want to serve the community. We do it because it's the right thing to do.



Q&A with Jesselee Leachman (Continued)



I first became aware of your group after passing a car with the Zom-B13 logo parked by the river. It was the first year we'd moved here, and my immediate reaction was thank god there are fellow weirdos in this town!

We're OK with being called weird. Actually, we embrace the word. Everyone on the team is a volunteer, and one of the main requirements for membership is being a good person. We absolutely want people to know that we are a safe, supportive group for everybody.

Zom-B13 had quite a strong presence at the Pendleton Pride parade. Could you speak to the team's support for the LGBTQ+ community?

Zom-B13's support for the LGBTQ+ community is unwavering - we're always trying to learn about how to be better allies, to support and protect our most vulnerable community members. When we showed up at the pride parade (we've done three so far) it's like we're in a battle tank in our ZombieFinder - our way of demonstrating support for the LGBTQ+ community.

A lot of my friends in the LGBTQ+ community are really into The Walking Dead and zombie horror in general.

Oh, the feeling is mutual. Zombies don't care if a person is straight, gay, bi, whatever. To a zombie, everyone is *equally delicious*.

What does Zom-B13 have planned for Halloween? What other events are you planning for the coming months and years?

Halloween is our busiest time of the year - we'll be doing the Echo Corn Maze, AKA Field Of Screams again this year. We started doing that four years ago and have been invited back ever since. This year we'll be "zombie-ing up" and participating inside of the maze once again. The Haunted Corn Maze is really the only event of the year when we let loose and deliberately try to scare people.

Yeah, I totally noticed that you guys aren't really trying to scare people.

No, outside of Halloween we tend to tone it down while still having fun. Of course, we'll also be participating in the 1st annual Halloween Parade in Pendleton on Saturday the 25th.

Final question: In the event of a zombie outbreak what are your suggestions for spots to hold out and make a last stand? Arts Center? City Hall? Walmart?

First survey the location. Medication, first aid and water are crucial for survival in any undead emergency. But for security, definitely the prison, as long as it hasn't been breached. It already has weapons and plenty of motivated volunteers, which are crucial in a zombie outbreak.

Sure, the prison worked out for Rick Grimes & company on The Walking Dead! (Laughs) Yeah, for season three at least.



Let's Go Travel...(to La Grande)

Good neighbors are good to have, and in Pendleton's case we're lucky to have a number of cities worth visiting well within driving distance. As a former travel writer, I find myself asking questions like why is this place worth visiting when exploring a place. As the editor of a newsletter promoting downtown Pendleton, I feel an added responsibility to use my column to answer the question what can we learn from our neighbors?

I'll start with the second question:

Our two cities share a few features, including similar "downtown-adjacent" shopping options (Walmart, Safeway, and Grocery Outlet). We both have highly walkable downtown areas boasting a plethora of stores, restaurants and other attractions serving locals and tempting drivers on I-84 to pull off the highway, stretch their legs and (hopefully) spend some money before continuing on their journeys.

For my money - and I'm probably biased here - I feel like Pendleton has the edge over our nearest eastern neighbor in two important areas: Historical preservation, which Pendleton does well, and drinking venues. Because let's be honest - from craft beer to wine, whiskey to gin, no city in Eastern Oregon serves spirits as well as Pendleton.

Still, there are two areas in which *I humbly submit to readers* that PDT might emulate LG.

The first of these I alluded to in July's newsletter, where I suggested that an old-school Main Street pharmacy might do well in our town. While I'd mentioned Hermiston's own main street pharmacy (complete with lunch counter and comic rack for those looking for that *Norman Rockwell* experience), La Grande also boasts a beloved downtown pharmacy. While the Red Cross Drug Store lacks a lunch-counter, it does have an old-school candy store to go along with its fully-functioning pharmacy.



The second La Grande venue I'd love to see manifested in Pendleton are its variety of downtown grocery options. While Pendleton is lucky to have Moe Mart (probably the only place within a hundred miles to get Durian taffy), more than a few fellow Pendletonian's have mentioned that they travel to either La Grande's Nature's Pantry or Andy's Market in College Place to buy goods in those markets' bulk bins.

Would a mid-sized market featuring health food options and bulk bins be a welcome addition to Pendleton's downtown? How about an old-fashioned Main Street drugstore? In my opinion both businesses wouldn't merely survive - they'd thrive. (And parking issues aside, both might fit very nicely on the east side of Main Street between Court Street and the River, AKA Wicked Kitty Block.)



Let's Go Travel... (Cont'd)

...As for the first question, well, geothermal hot springs are a geological feature that you either have or you don't, and unless the crew currently setting off dynamite in the quarry over on Westgate happen to uncover a hitherto unknown fault line, it's unlikely that Pendleton will ever have a place like Hot Lake Lodge (a few miles east of La Grande).

I discovered the hot springs a few years back, and with a recent addition of several pools of geothermally heated water and a cold plunge pool the place has only gotten better. The hotel is gorgeously renovated, and while I've not yet had the pleasure of spending the night I'm absolutely looking forward to doing so in the future - not just because spending the night will allow me to stargaze while soaking, and not just because they have an excellent gastropub featuring a selection of adult beverages best enjoyed at least a dozen hours before operating a motor vehicle.

My other reason for wanting to spend the night at the lodge (which also fits perfectly with the Halloween theme of this issue) involves my lifelong fascination with the supernatural. More than a few folks sensitive to this sort of thing have reported seeing (or otherwise sensing) ghostly apparitions while overnighting at the lodge. While this may not be a selling point for some, for others (yours truly included) it's travel writer catnip.

What do you think, dear reader - would a mid-size grocery store and/or old-school drugstore thrive on Main Street? Do the ghosts of Pendleton's illustrious past still roam downtown? Got ideas for future Let's Go columns?
